> A community protected from vaccinepreventable diseases


Mission

BENEFITS OF IMMUNIZATION

- Immunizations greatly reduce disease, disability, and death
- > One of the 10 great public health achievements in the 20th century
- > Eradication (global smallpox 1980)
- > Elimination (U.S. measles 2000, U.S. rubella 2004)
- Near-Elimination (global polio, U.S. diphtheria)






WHAT IS PUBLIC HEALTH LAW?

Public Health Law is the intersection of the legal authority and duty of government to protect the public's health and the legally protected rights of the individual.



PUBLIC HEALTH LAW BALANCE



GOVERNMENTAL DUTIES, POWERS, AND LIMITS

- Does government have a duty to protect the public's health and safety?
- > What *power* does government have to regulate in the name of public health?
- What *limits* exist in the exercise of public health powers?



PUBLIC HEALTH LAWS, POLICIES & ETHICS

Conditions to determine whether promoting public health warrants overriding individual liberty:

- > Effectiveness
- Proportionality
- Necessity
- Least infringement
- > Public justification

LEGAL AUTHORITY FOR MANDATORY IMMUNIZATION LAWS

- State police power to protect the health, safety, morals, and general welfare of the people
- State tools to protect public health include mandatory and compulsory immunization requirements
- > Police powers must balance duty to protect community health with personal liberty
- Action must be necessary to protect public health and not arbitrary or unreasonable



HISTORY OF MANDATORY IMMUNIZATION LAWS

- > 1809- Massachusetts law granting local boards of health authority to require vaccination "when necessary for public health or safety"
- > 1827- City of Boston ordinance requiring vaccination for school attendance
- > 1855- Massachusetts law requiring vaccination for school attendance
 - Trend spread from northeast states to Midwest, southern, and western states over next few decades



JACOBSON V. MASSACHUSETTS, 197 U.S. 11 (1905)

- Upheld use of police powers to protect the public's health
- State may delegate public health authority to local health authorities
- > Imposed limits on individual liberty if necessary to protect public health
- > "There are manifold restraints to which every person is necessarily subject for the common good."



STATE MANDATORY IMMUNIZATION LAWS

- All states have mandatory immunization laws for children as a condition of school attendance
- > Some states have mandatory immunization laws for attendance at schools of higher education
- Some states have mandatory immunization laws for health care workers
- Many states provide for mandatory or compulsory immunization during a declared public health emergency




NUMBER OF CONSCIENTIOUS OBJECTIONS IN PUBLIC AND PRIVATE SCHOOLS








PERCENT OF CONSCIENTIOUS OBJECTIONS IN PUBLIC AND PRIVATE SCHOOLS








